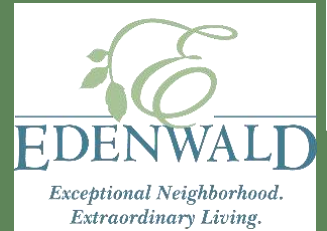

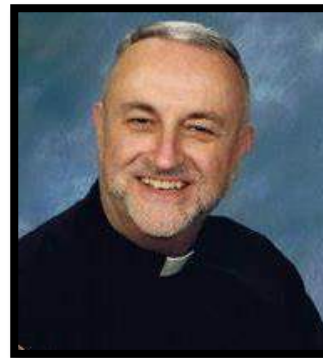
Wednesday, November 6th at 7:30pm **Jamie Costello: News Talk from a Hometown Boy**

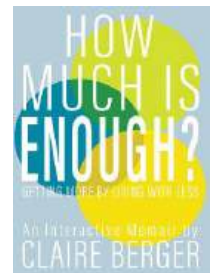

WELCOME NEW RESIDENT-VIVIAN ADELBERG RUDOW

Vivian Adelberg Rudow (“Vickie”), a Baltimore native, recently moved into Terraces 1223, a large bright airy apartment, housing her Steinway grand piano surrounded by an interesting mélange of artwork, family photos, Leonard Bernstein, a pair of cello cases decorated by Amalie Rothschild electrified with speakers, a hockey stick once belonging to Wayne Gretzky, and other mementoes to remind her of her work and travels.

I was assigned to interview Vivian for this issue because of our mutual connection to Peabody but it also turns out that we both lived on the same street in Roland Park, but neither of these possible intersections overlapped at the same time.

For Vickie, the happiest event of her life was marrying the very tall David B. Rudow, a tax lawyer (an “honest” one!). They had three sons (who attended Friends School) and then six wonderful grandchildren, none of whom currently live in Baltimore. After 42 years in Roland Park, Vickie and David moved to Ristreau. Sadly, David passed away three years ago. Her family is decidedly first in her life, but composition and music are a healthy second.

Vickie started her piano study at the Peabody Preparatory, returning later to earn her Bachelor of Music in Piano at the Conservatory. She then went to the University of Michigan but after a year returned to Peabody (after all David, her love, was in Baltimore) to complete her Master of Music in Composition. She briefly taught piano at the Preparatory and Conservatory, but knew composing was her calling.

In 2019 she was awarded the Johns Hopkins Distinguished Alumni Award which “honors alumni who have typified the Johns Hopkins tradition of excellence and brought credit to the University by their professional achievement.”

Adelberg Rudow has won an amazing number of ASCAP Plus awards for her compositions. *Force III* was premiered by the Baltimore Symphony and she was the first Maryland composer to have an orchestral work performed in the new Meyerhoff Hall. In 1986 she won first prize at the International Electroacoustic Music Competition in Bourges, France - the first American woman to win first prize. She visited Cuba five times for performances of her music and has had numerous performances around the world including piano performances by Stanley Wong in Hong Kong. In her busy professional life, she has won the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers (ASCAP Plus) awards for 29 consecutive years and since 2012 has been a voting member in the Grammys. In 1988 she even held a music festival at the Inner Harbor featuring composers from all over the world when on cue, she got the boats in the harbor to blow their horns during one of the works. When asked what makes her happy, she replied “hearing her music played – played well!” With Maryland poet Grace Cavalieri their collaborative works are broadcast on satellite radio. Her Johns Hopkins award concluded “we congratulate you for your work as a substantive and committed artist of our time.”

When asked what brought her to Edenwald, she mused that she likes it here, the food is good, and because the walls are thick, playing the piano doesn’t bother her neighbors. Her piano movers have been here twice to place it in just right the location in the living room, so it is as happy as she is.

WELCOME NEW RESIDENT-JUDY WEISHAMPEL

In 2017, she was diagnosed with Parkinson disease, the same diagnosis her husband had received when he was 42. Their marriage didn't last, but David is still living, being cared for by their younger daughter. Judy enjoys gardening, sewing and cooking. She lives in apartment 1110. Her house hasn't sold yet, so that is her main concern now. When I was leaving her apartment, she gave me a loaf of freshly baked banana bread. Yum! Thank you, Judy.

She rode the subway every day. In the middle of her junior year, her parents bought a house in the suburbs of Rockland County. She went from riding the subway to riding a yellow school bus. She knew nobody in the community, which was a challenge.

She received her undergraduate degree from Hunter College, her master's degree from Penn State, and a second master's degree from Towson. As a retired speech-language pathologist, she arrived at Edenwald to find four colleagues with whom she had had professional contact over the years.

She was married in 1967 as she started her master's program. Her former husband was an audiologist who wanted to get his Ph.D. when they moved to Baltimore. She worked in both medical and school settings.

Robin has two children, both born in Baltimore. Her son was part of the Orioles major league staff, in 2014, working for Buck Showalter and was an Orioles first instant replay coordinator. Her daughter is a certified hand therapist working at the Lutherville Hand Clinic who completed a mission to Ghana where she presented information and demonstrations on splinting and has written a chapter in a textbook. Robin has four grandchildren.

Robin is happy to be at Edenwald and meeting new people. She does warn us to be careful that she doesn't run over our toes with her wheelchair. She has not had her wheelchair license for a long time.

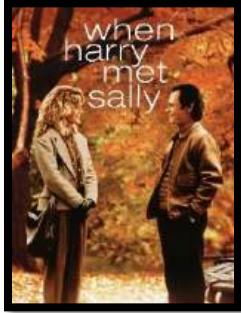
