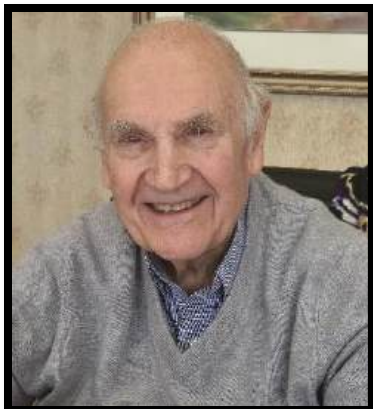
Linda said that Howard took care of the sheep, chickens, calves and peacocks.

Linda's community activities include being President of the Hebrew Immigration Aid Society (HIAS) and serving on the National Board of HIAS.

Howard was and continues to be a very successful seasoned business, estates and trust lawyer who represents clients ranging from single-owned businesses to large family-owned companies. He received his B.A. from University of Maryland in 1958 where he was the Student Government President. He received his JD degree from the University of Maryland Carey Law School in 1962 and his LLM from Georgetown Law School in 1964. Howard was named among the "Best Lawyers in America" on a list for Corporate Law. He was a recipient of the Daily Record's Super Lawyers in 2008. Howard has been involved with Kennedy Krieger Institute for 38 years as director and 6 years as Chair and Vice chair of the Board of Directors. He has been President of Woodholme Country Club, the Center Club, his national college fraternity Sigma Alpha Mu and chaired the boards of The Leadership and Leadership Maryland.

We of the “Edenwald family” have long been blessed with an outstanding group of friendly and intelligent neighbors. Just when we think that there surely can’t be any more like them wishing to join us, another fascinating couple joins the “family.” Case in point: Dr. Sheldon Glass and his wife Saralynn, who moved into Terraces Apt. 1022.

While not raised here, they are now Baltimoreans of very long standing. Saralynn grew up in Huntington, West Virginia and Sheldon came from Binghamton, New York. They met at a cousin’s wedding, where Saralynn was maid of honor, and were married a year later in 1959. They raised three children: a son who is a lawyer living in Annapolis but works in Baltimore; a daughter in Washington, D.C. who teaches remotely at the City University of New York School of Public Health and in person at Johns Hopkins University at the New Hopkins Building in Washington, D.C. Another daughter, who has a degree in social work, lives in Vermont and is a stay-at-home mother who is writing a book about the things that antibodies do for our bodies. Six grandchildren and two great grands complete the family.

The names Saralynn, Sheldon, and Johns Hopkins University blend into a story of lifelong service. Saralynn holds a B.S. and M.S. from that institution. She was a founding member of the Johns Hopkins Alumni Council and of the School of Education’s National Advisory Council. She is a retired social worker and has also volunteered for a few organizations, among them Beth El Congregation, the Associated, the Jewish Museum of Maryland, Park School, and Pets on Wheels.

Likewise, Sheldon is a distinguished member of the Hopkins community, having made significant contributions to it for over 5 decades. With his medical degree from the University of Virginia’s School of Medicine he was first a pediatrician during his military service and was the Chief of Pediatrics at Patterson Army Hospital. He developed an interest in psychiatry, and while serving a residency in that field at Hopkins Hospital, also earned a master’s in education and was invited to teach for the School of Education. Over the years, he developed 5 new courses, including one on group counseling that influenced the future of education. His particular interests are in adolescent psychiatry and addiction medicine. Like Saralynn, he is a founder of the School of Education’s National Advisory Council. In 2010 Sheldon sold his own practice and became the National Medical Director of BayMark Health Services, the largest substance abuse program in North America.

Having read the information above, it will come as no surprise to you that the Glasses have endowed a Counseling Scholarship at Johns Hopkins, which has supported numerous students. Bravo!

Kent Devereaux: Reinventing the Liberal Arts College

Changing demographics, technological innovations, decreasing state and federal support for higher education, and political considerations have forever altered the U.S. higher education landscape. Colleges and universities that fail to change will not survive. In response to these challenges, Goucher College has achieved phenomenal successes by reinventing itself. In the past few years, this small, nationally renowned liberal arts college located in Baltimore,

Maryland has announced plans to create the first university retirement community in Maryland with Edenwald Senior Living, a new partnership with Whiting Turner Contracting Company that will see that company relocate their headquarters onto Goucher's campus, and the construction of the new Lewent Science Center to house the College's growing programs in the sciences. Goucher's President Kent Devereaux will discuss these new initiatives, as well as what comes next.

Kent Devereaux is the President of Goucher College, a private, nonprofit, liberal arts college located next door to Edenwald in Towson, Maryland. Kent served previously as President of the New Hampshire Institute of Art, Professor and Chair of the Music Department at Cornish College of the Arts, as a faculty member at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago and the California Institute of the Arts (CalArts), and as a Fulbright Fellow at the Indonesian Arts Institute in Surakarta, Java, Indonesia. In addition, Kent pioneered many developments in online education while Senior Vice President and Chief Technology Officer at Encyclopædia Britannica, Inc. in the 1990s and as Senior Vice President and Dean of Curriculum at Kaplan University in the early 2000s.

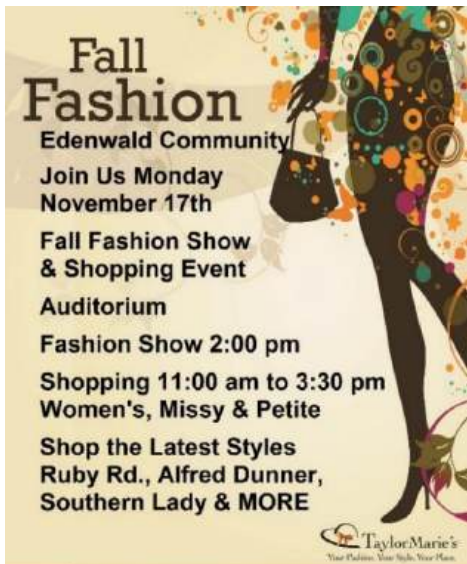

It concentrates on the family after World War II, when Sam's son Jules, a salesman, reluctantly joins his cousin Izzy in opening a department store. Medicare Part D Prescription Drug program

Open enrollment is underway for Medicare Part D. Enrollment is from October 15th - December 7th. If you have a Medicare Part D prescription drug plan this is your time to see if your plan will cover your prescriptions for 2026. You can go online at www.medicare.gov and input your prescriptions to see all the plans that service this zip code as well as projected costs to you for 2026. If you need assistance, you can contact Meghan Curtis or Toya McClenny.

Medicare Advantage Plans

If you are enrolled in a Medicare Advantage plan, please pay close attention to your Annual Notice of Changes for 2026. This is communication to make you aware of changes to the plan for 2026. This can include premium changes, if the plan will continue, and if the same provider network will remain. Open enrollment for Advantage plans is Oct 15 - December 7th.

Maryland State Retirees

Via Benefits is a company that Maryland is using to assist with Maryland State retirees' prescription drug coverage. If you are a retiree of the state written communication is being sent out regarding your prescription drug coverage. To receive your full benefit, you must use Via Benefits to coordinate your prescription drug plan with Medicare part D plans.

Covid Tests

Edenwald is no longer receiving free covid tests. Independent living residents who wish to be tested for covid will need to buy their own test kits. You can order these tests on Amazon or buy them at local pharmacies. Austin Pharmacy currently has tests for 11.99. The Medical Suite will still be available to assist with the instructions for the test.

Saturday, November 1st: "Tora! Tora! Tora!" (1970)

This movie is a 1970 epic war film that dramatizes the events leading up to the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941, from both American and Japanese positions. The film follows the path to war as Japan and the United States face escalating tensions due to the US embargo on raw materials crucial for Japan's war efforts. On December 7, 1941, Japanese forces launch a surprise attack on Pearl Harbor, catching the American forces completely off guard, resulting in significant destruction of ships and aircraft. The film underscores the critical failures in communication and intelligence that contributed to the disaster, prompting significant reforms in military strategy and preparedness.

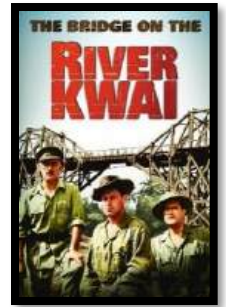

Set in May and June of 1940, "Dunkirk" portrays the Dunkirk evacuation, where Allied soldiers from Belgium, the British Commonwealth, and France are surrounded by the German Army. The film unfolds through three distinct perspectives: land, sea, and air, each representing different time frames.

Saturday, November 22nd: "The Monuments Men" (2014)

Set against the backdrop of World War II, the film is inspired by the true story of the Monuments, Fine Arts, and Archives program, which was established to protect cultural heritage during the war. The story begins in 1943 when Frank Stokes convinces President Roosevelt that the art treasures of Western civilization are at risk of being lost forever due to the ongoing conflict. He assembles a team of seven museum directors, curators, and art historians, known as the Monuments Men, to locate and recover these invaluable works of art before they are destroyed or stolen by the Nazis.

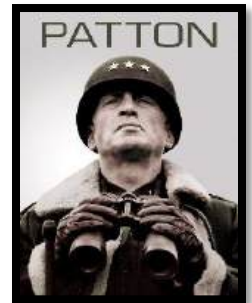

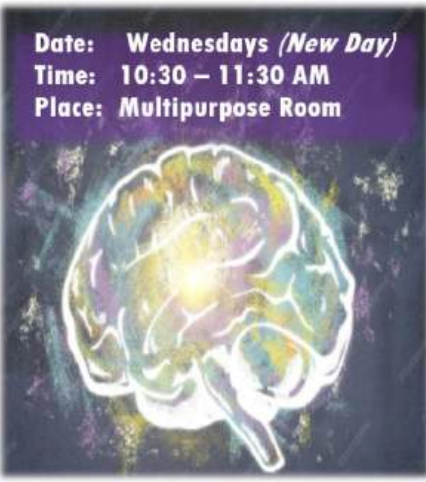

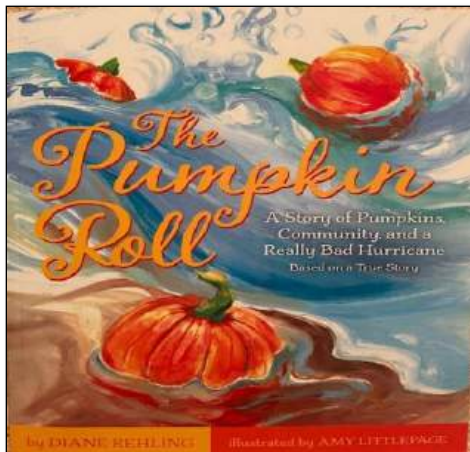
